During the month of January, the English Montreal School Board celebrated how the French language is cultivated at our schools through the arts. At Dante Elementary School in St. Leonard, programming was unveiled at the Board's first-ever press conference held exclusively in French. EMSB Assistant Director General Jack Chadirdjian and EMSB Educational Consultant Sonya Jean were the emcees. One of the special guests was Stéphane Tétrault, a celebrated Canadian cellist who has made international headlines. He attended the EMSB's FACE and Royal Vale schools. When he was enrolled at FACE elementary school, he didn't speak English. By the time he graduated from Royal Vale High School, he was bilingual and went on to become a professional musician.

In January, artistic and cultural events were held at schools during the month, many as part of the Quebec government's La culture à l'école program. Our theme was À la CSEM, on cultive le français ... jour après jour.

Le regretté M. Peck a amorcé sa carrière d'enseignant dans les années 1930. Il a été surintendant de français pour le ministère de l'Éducation et a également occupé des postes similaires au sein de l'ancienne Commission scolaire de Westmount et de l'ancienne Commission des écoles protestantes du Grand Montréal. Il a été responsable du département de français à l'école secondaire de Lachine et directeur adjoint à l'école secondaire Riverdale dans l'Ouest de l'île, après avoir enseigné en Afrique. Il est coauteur avec Elizabeth Buchanan du manuel d'enseignement du français, langue seconde, intitulé Le français pratique, qui fut une référence incontournable dans les écoles anglophones protestantes du Québec pendant plus de 20 ans. Ce prix a été institué en son honneur par la famille Peck et la CSEM en 2002.

I think it's important in this time especially to showcase that our schools teach a very high level of French. You get a quality education within our public system, and we're very proud of that. Our results show that. We also want to break this perception within francophone Quebec that the English community is unilingual or that the English community rejects French in any way. We don't. We're actually proud of the French that we teach. And parents demand it.

College students now need an eligibility certificate to be guaranteed one of the capped spots in English CEGEPs. But the government has been denying the documents to young adults who graduated high school in French, arguing they've forfeited their rights. In a way, that is good for us, because it boosts our enrolment. But it's sad that people feel they have to take these steps because their children's post-secondary studies could be in jeopardy. I've


actually heard of some parents who decided to transfer their kids out of the French system or out of private schools to make sure they get the English eligibility papers by transferring their kids to English schools.

The reasons to go to English schools include French programs, a bilingual education and the sense of a community. Our schools have the highest success rates and lower dropout rates. So we're

actually doing something right in education, and the government should be looking at that and trying to emulate those things and incorporating them into the French system instead of trying to overhaul the system and trying to impose that on us as well.

Yes, we have taken the Quebec government to court on Bills 21, 40 and 96. However, from a pedagogical point of view, we continually wish to make it clear

that we are far from a threat to the French language. On the contrary; we represent an asset. Just ask Minister of Finance Eric Girard, who is also responsible for relations with the anglophone community. For the second year in a row we had him as a guest at one of our schools. This year staff and students at Dunrae Gardens Elementary School in TMR communicated with him exclusively in French.


At the English Montreal School Board, we remain exceedingly proud of the educational product we provide to our 35,000 students in the youth and adult sectors.

I urge readers to go to our website at www.emsb.qc.ca and view our recently published annual report for 2022-2023. It showcases the EMSB's remarkable achievements in graduation and qualification success rates. The seven-year graduation rate for the 2015 cohort soared to an unprecedented 92.7 percent, marking a one-percent increase from the previous year and positioning the Board as the leader in the province's public sector.

With a six-year graduation rate at 91 percent, the Board has not only met but exceeded its target, setting a trajectory to maintain rates above 92 percent. While the gender-based success rate gap persisted at 3.6 percent, there was an increase in the seven-year graduation and qualification success rate for students with exceptional codes, rising from 74.3

percent to 75.1 percent in 2022. The EMSB remains vigilant in monitoring student performance across key courses essential for graduation, ensuring alignment with the recently approved Commitment to Success Plan, which encompasses academic goals, school climate monitoring and the integration of new secondary-level programs.

Furthermore, the report outlines objectives aimed at developing the preschool program and fostering digital competency among all stakeholders. These initiatives align with the EMSB's dedication to continuous improvement and inclusive education, driving forward its commitment to academic excellence and holistic development.

EMSB welcomes more teachers from France

The EMSB is pleased to have surpassed its expectations for the 2023-2024 academic year with the hiring of nine new teachers from France. This brings its contingent from France to a total of 12, who are teaching in nine elementary schools as generalists across all grades, and three in high schools who teach the French language as well as other courses taught in French. New among them, in elementary schools, are Grade 6 teachers Justine Biotteau at Bancroft and Flora Boisteau at Dunrae Gardens, Marianne Landru teaching in the Success for All program at Hampstead, Ymene Belazzoug teaching Grade 2 and 5 at Pierre Elliott Trudeau, Léa Sautière teaching Grade 3 at St. Monica and Léa Gasqueres



teaching Kindergarten at Willingdon. At the high school level, Lea Garault is teaching French as a core program to Secondary II and III students at Marymount Academy International, Simon Mallier is teaching the French language and other courses in French at various levels at Royal Vale High School and Hugo Caloin is teaching courses in French at Westmount High School. They join three teachers, already in their second year with the EMSB: Grade 4 teachers Diane Leuillot at Edinburgh and Julie Caplier at Roslyn, and Pre-K teacher teacher Adèle Guilloteau at Royal Vale Elementary.

Students learn about the advent cultural calendar

On January 9 2024, following the EMSB's press conference at Dante Elementary School announcing kindergarten registration, various speakers at the event visited classes to talk with students.

In Cinthia Vicario's 3rd grade class, students received a presentation by Sonya Jean, French Language consultant at the

Ms. Jean showed students the cultural calendar, created by the Board's French language consultants. Through this calendar, students will learn about Quebec culture every day through artists, athletes, authors, sports teams and more!

On this day, students learned about an author and illustrator, well known for her stories focusing on diversity and inclusion. After watching a short video, the group was asked if any of them aspire to be like her and what kind of books they would make. They were then invited to pick one of her books to read as a group via Biblius, an online e-book platform. Another fun suggested activity was for students to write and draw a story in the author's style.

We asked the creators behind the calendar, Pedagogical Consultants Marie-Claude Bergeron, Sonya Jean and Anik Malenfant, to tell us more about it.

Q: Why did your team choose to create a cultural calendar to celebrate the month of À la CSEM On cultive le français ... jour après jour?

A: Being bilingual is more than speaking and understanding a language. Being bilingual also means having "the key" to access the culture associated with that language! What a privilege it is for our students to have access to an education in both French and English, since it also gives them access to the "precious treasures" of our two languages! What's more, exposing students to "cultural landmarks" is part of both the French as a Second Language and Arts programs.

Q: Why is it important to teach French as a second language through the arts (visual arts, music and theater)?

A: Using the arts to teach French creates an "emotional" link with the language. Combining the arts and French not only teaches the language, it also makes French interesting, stimulating and alive. It also teaches vocabulary in authentic contexts.

Q: How do you hope students and their families will appreciate the calendar?

A: We hope the calendar will pique our students' curiosity and inspire them to continue exploring francophone Quebec culture...day after day, both at school and at home.





A hot bed of activity celebrating French Quebec culture

Although artistic and cultural activities take place in French all during the year across EMSB schools, several special events were planned for the month of January.

The new year started off with a diverse selection of artistic and cultural activities in French – from traditional Québéçois jigs to puppetry to poetry. As part of the Quebec government's *La culture à l'école* program, Quebec artists, writers and cultural organizations who are part of the *Répertoire culture-éducation*, are invited to visit schools and provide a live cultural or artistic experience based on their genre.

Nicolas Doyon, Arts Education Consultant and Culture in School Respondent at the EMSB, works with both the specialists who teach music, art or drama, and with classroom teachers throughout the year to bring interesting artistic experiences to students. He believes that there is great success teaching French via the arts.

"Integrating cultural and artistic activities enhances motivation and engagement among learners," he said. "It can also make language-learning more meaningful and relatable, as students connect with the artistic and cultural context of that language."

Several schools took part in the program this year, with many happening in January.

Here is a snapshot of some of them:

Five-year-old Kindergarten students at Pierre de Courbertin Elementary School in St. Leonard participated in a workshop called "Les Hurlus-Berlue," led by Le Théâtre Tortue Berlue. Students created their puppets, first by giving them eyes, then adding a head, hair, a mouth... and then a voice! They learned how to teach their puppets to communicate and show different emotions, all the while having fun.

Teachers Maxime Mallette and Patrick Charland were channeling their inner Jack Black at Pierre Elliott Trudeau Elementary School

This year's trio helped us mark our celebration of French culture with a special three-song performance of Ensemble (Coeur de Pirate), L'amérique pleure (Les Cowboys Fringants). Grade 4 students at John Caboto Academy practiced mime during a theatre workshop with Tina Milo in early January. They learned how to use facial expressions and gestures to show spectators what emotions they were trying to portray.

Resolution for Compulsory Holocaust Education

In the wake of the province of Ontario introducing mandatory Holocaust learning for the first time in elementary schools this fall, the EMSB has adopted a resolution calling for the Quebec government to do the same.

The complete resolution reads as follows:

WHEREAS the Holocaust marked the state-sponsored persecution and mass murder of millions of European Jews, Romani people, the intellectually disabled, political dissidents and homosexuals by the German Nazi regime between 1933 and 1945;

WHEREAS the province of Ontario has introduced mandatory Holocaust learning for the first time in elementary schools this fall;

WHEREAS studies show that when Holocaust education is provided, hate crimes and incidents against Jews decrease significantly;

WHEREAS B'nai Brith Canada states that making Holocaust education mandatory reduces hate incidents targeting other racial and religious minorities;

WHEREAS in 2022, B'nai Brith Canada documented 722 antisemitic incidents in Quebec;

WHEREAS a 2020 survey by Echoes and Reflection, a prominent American program that equips educators for effective instruction of the Holocaust, found that those who received Holocaust education are more tolerant and more comfortable with people of a different race or sexual orientation than those who did not:

WHEREAS the EMSB has initiated its own Holocaust Education Program, including guest speakers and visits to the Montreal Holocaust Museum;

WHEREAS as Holocaust survivors age and pass away, it is more important than ever that the education system play an increasingly important role;

WHEREAS as the present-day History curriculum in public high schools allows for some opportunities to discuss the Holocaust:

WHEREAS The Foundation for Genocide Education has produced a pedagogical guide entitled "Teaching about Genocide," allowing Quebec teachers to become the first in the country to have access to such an educational tool to support them in the sometimes difficult and

challenging task of studying genocides in the classroom.

IT WAS MOVED BY Joe Ortona, Jamie Fabian, Ellie Israel and Julien Feldman THAT the English Montreal School Board call upon Quebec's Ministry of Education to make Holocaust education compulsory in elementary and high schools and that the Ministry consults the Ontario curriculum and mandate the Conseil Supérieur de l'Éducation and other stakeholders to determine how best to introduce this new

curriculum and ensure teacher training.

Genocide Education

The EMSB Council of Commissioners has adopted a resolution calling for the Quebec Ministry of Education to consider and implement the inclusion of genocide studies in the history courses offered at the elementary and secondary levels, For the EMSB, the inclusion of genocide studies should encompass a diverse range of case studies, including but not limited to the

Holocaust, the Rwandan Genocide, the Armenian Genocide, and others, to provide students with a well-rounded perspective on the global impact of these events. Resources, teaching materials, and professional development opportunities for educators should be made available to facilitate effective and sensitive delivery of genocide studies in the classroom. The Quebec Ministry of Education should collaborate with experts, educators, and community representatives to develop a curriculum that is

inclusive, culturally sensitive, and reflective of the diverse experiences of affected communities. Periodic reviews and updates to the curriculum should be conducted to ensure the relevance and accuracy of the content in line with ongoing research and developments in the field of genocide studies. Last October the EMSB Council adopted a resolution for Quebec to make Holocaust education compulsory in elementary and high schools.

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The Grey Cup comes to Gardenview

McGloster played basketball at St. Anthony High School in Jersey City, a national powerhouse under legendary coach Bob Hurley. "I went to Syracuse University on a recruiting visit and they offered me a football scholarship," he said.

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
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
