



The arts and crafts station, which was set up in a quiet area outside the gymnasium was also very-well received and brought about much fun.

Big Brother/Big Sister Project with Perspectives I and II High Schools

At the beginning of the year, a suggestion was made that our school partner up with a high school and develop a big brother / big sister mentorship program for our students.

I was very interested in this project idea, and I set out on the mission to figure out how I could make this work. There were issues such as transport and attendance that needed to be discussed and, most important, we needed to ensure that we had the trust and commitment of all those taking part in this project.

Our prospective partners were going to be Perspectives I and II, two schools from the alternative network of our school board. I visited the schools and went to every class to explain the project and to circulate a sign-up sheet for those students who were interested. Two weeks later our project was ready to begin! And since then, every Friday, five high school students come to our school at 9:00 a.m. and are paired up with five of our own students. The intention is for the dyads to spend the day interacting while they both take part in a cooking workshop.

Students immediately bonded with their partner and now enjoy cooking together and talking about everything. They express themselves openly and share experiences and challenges they have faced as well as strategies they have used to resolve them. The high school students also give sound advice to the younger students. We often hear them telling our students to "stay in school" and to "listen to your teachers".

The project has been running since mid-November and our students look forward to Fridays because they will work with their big brother/big sister. We also rotate students every Friday prompting some of them to express the wish to participate on a weekly basis. Indeed, we made one exception and the student meets with their mentor weekly. This has already had a very positive impact on the student's behaviour as witnessed by the behaviour technician and others.

This project has great impact, and it is our intention to keep it going for as long as our students need it.
