STRUGGLING READERS TIPS FOR PARENTS

Some Characteristics

- Difficulties with matching sounds to letters.
- Guessing words (Jane Just, you'll be a pirate).
- Reading without expression and slowly (poor fluency).
- Difficulties summarizing what has just been read.
- Difficulties understanding what has been read.
- Difficulties using prior knowledge and/or own experiences to connect with texts

- By choosing books or other reading material targeting your child's interests : sports, fantasy, cooking, construction, comic strips, jokes, science, nature, space, traveling, etc.
- By reading to your child and with your child (turn taking) on a daily basis for 10-15 min a day.



Foster Phonological Awareness

- A broad term that encompasses the ability to recognize that words are composed of discrete speech sounds and to perceive and manipulate sounds.
- It includes the ability to rhyme words, segment or break words into syllables and to be able to isolate and count the number of phonemes.
- By doing rhyming activities, counting syllables, etc.

Foster Reading Comprehension

- Before reading:
 - Look at the title and the book cover (picture)and ask your child:
 - "What do you think this book, article, will be about?"
 - Give your own predictions and explain what clues you are using to make that prediction.
 - Explain what is the purpose of reading this book or material. "We are reading this for..."

Foster Reading Comprehension (Con't)

• While reading

- Look at the pictures, photos, ect to predict what is happening.
- When you encounter a new word (new vocabulary) or a word difficult to decode you can model out loud how to address it:
 - "Let's look at the first letters and let's try sounding it out."
 - "Let's go back a bit and replace it by another word that would make sense in the sentence. Does that makes sense?"
 - Read the word to your child and explain its meaning if needs be.

Foster Reading Comprehension (Con't)



• While reading:

- Model good oral reading with expression and pauses according to the punctuation. This helps with modeling fluency. Re-read the same favorite book with your child to practice fluency.
- Ask questions and summarize:
 - "Who are the characters in this story?"
 - "What is happening ?"
 - "Where is it happening?" "Can you see it in your head?"
 - "How do you think this character is feeling about...?" "How do you know?"
 - "What do you think is going to happen next?"

Foster Reading Comprehension (Con't)

- After reading:
 - Review with your child what you just read.
 - "We just finished this ... (chapter, book, article), and if I remember well it was about..."
 - I remember reading a ... (book, an article,) seeing a video, a movie that had the same topic and... or It had the same idea, a different ending... Let me tell you about them.
 - "I really enjoyed this (book, chapter, article,..) because..."
 - "I didn't like this reading because..."
