Went overs all lists and reviewed constraints e.g. no specific brand requests.


- As in previous years, there are required and optional items.

Increased by \$10 on average from last year due to general increase in cost of printing and binding. Lunch supervision is the same. If registered for daycare, parents pay \$9.25/day so they do not pay the \$225 lunch supervision fees. Kindergarten is not using agenda but using pochette for handouts. There are no supplies for daycare.

3.3 Sexuality education plan

Shalani noted dissatisfaction with response from special education consultant confirming that GBs are unable to make any changes to the content. It is frustrating to be asked and not be able to comment or update the material.

Starting next year, GBs will no longer be asked to vote on the sexuality education plan. Parents can abstain from their child participating in the sexuality education, but they must apply at the ministry level (not school or EMSB).

3.4 GB scholarships - 2x \$50 scholarships were approved last year

4. Items requiring discussion:

- 4.1 <u>Building the fencing around school for student safety an urgent and important goal</u> WPS put in a project request at EMSB and currently at needs assessment. Initial quotes \$24k-50k. EMSB should help; PPO will fundraise. In process but moving slowly. No timeline yet. If go to public tender, it will take longer. This is a safety issue, so it should be a priority.
- 4.2 Enrolment

536 students registered now (includes 6 special needs classes); this is higher number than same time last year and expected to grow by 100-120 over summer when families receive eligibility. Students who lost eligibility have already been removed. Currently 42 homerooms for 700 students therefore class sizes are low.

4.3 Heat in classrooms

With the higher temperatures and no air conditioning, we are worried about the heat in classrooms. Can we ask for donations or fundraising to place a fan in every class? WPS will do inventory of how many fans are needed.


5.1 Teacher's report

5.4 PPO report

- T-shirt fundraiser was a success. We sold around 250 t-shirts. We will be putting in a restock order for the end of year which may or may not arrive before the year end picnic and are looking into school tote bags with the school message (back of the t-shirt).
- Our next **Pizza day is May 31**. This will be our last Pizza Day of the year. Last day for orders is Monday, May 27.
- June Pizza Day has been cancelled, instead we are going to try and offer a • Domino's WPS Family and Friend night where families can order from Domino's and the school gets a portion of the profits. This is with the Domino's on Notre-Dame only. Proposed date: Thursday June 13.
- Year end picnic: Date confirmed for Friday June 7 or Friday June 14 (if it rains) 4:30-7:30pm. This will be a picnic where families bring their own food, however we will have some small drinks and snacks for sale. We are looking into an ice cream truck where scoops are \$2. At the year end picnic we will have a lost and found table, t-shirts for sale, games like the big chess, and possibly face painting. Will need to do a call for volunteers.
- In-school end of the year Freezie Day: June 12 or 13 (if it rains) at recess. Parent volunteers will set up a freezie station by the side door steps. Each child will be able to have a freezie.
- Financials:

Fundraising goal for the 24-25 school year will focus on fencing and the playground accessibility for all our students

We granted funding to help subsidize 2x grade end of the year class trips
