Battle Details: - During the fight with the German forces, a former Black Watch soldier (Whitley) never trained in night fighting in built up areas. He was important for the fight however, he withdrew. - The Black Watch was divided into a Company B and D.

- The attacking companies were out of contact with the battalion headquarters for approximately 5 hours.
- The Black Watch had to cross first at 2215 hours, because of double daylight savings.
- Company B formed the assault force, and Company D was to provide covering fire.

## CIRCUMSTANCES OF DEATH:

- The enemy shooters started firing from high ground and Stevenson (one of the members) got injured.
- Lieutenant Robert Eliot Austin got shot too and was badly injured.
- This injury led to his death, later in July.
- On June 6, 1944, 335 officers and men of that division were killed in action or died of wounds.
