Wallace Ian O'Hara  
1920-1941

Wallace Ian O'Hara, was born in Westmount, Quebec in 1920 and died overseas on March 26, 1941 at the age of 21. He was a navyman for the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve in the H.M.C.S Otter division that fought in World War II. He died overseas in Halifax and was buried in the Halifax Memorial, Nova Scotia, Canada. He was a 1938 Westmount High school graduate and was a very athletic student.
