THE UNFORTUNATE TRIP, APRIL 30TH, 1941

Hugh and his work colleagues were headed to the UK to obtain design specifications for the Wireless Set No. 19 radio for the allies in the war.

They traveled on the S.S. Nerissa, a cargo steamer that civilians and Canadian Army troops used to get between Canada and Britain.

Sadly, the cargo steamer got detected by radar in the Outer Hebrides of Scotland and was sunken by the German submarine U-552 using four destructive torpedoes.

Later, the No. 19 Wireless Set radio ended up being widely used in Canada in World War II
