

The young son of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Scott, of Westmount, Province of Quebec, was sadly 18 years old at the time of his passing. He was in the navy, and his division was the S.S. ## RICHARD SCOTT, 18, LOSES LIFE AT SEA

Son of W. B. Scott Was Grandson of Padre Scott of World War Fame

Richard Aird "Dick" Scott, 18year-old son of W. B. Scott, K.C., and Mrs. Scott, 611 Sydenham avenue, Westmount, has been lost at sea as a result of enemy action, according to word received late yesterday. He was a grandson of

Archdeacon Frederick George Scott, C.M.G., D.S.O., of Quebec City, noted patter of the World War. Dick Scott graduated from Westmount High School and until recently was an honor student in physics and mathematics in second year at the Faculty of Arts and Science of McGill University. During the summer of 1941 he

worked as an apprentice at Federal Aircraft, and last summer took the special accelerated summer school session at McGill, receiving his certificate of second year standing last January.

He tried to enlist in the fighting services and was rejected because of his eyesight. Hoping with the aid of spectacles to get into ground crew with the Royal Air Force he decided to work his passage overseas and signed on with the crew of a merchant ship as cabin boy. a member of the Ski Gulls, a competed in skiing events for Me Gill and was a well-known figure at St. Eauveur.

He was a frequent contributor to The Canadien Skier, and a member of the McGill Chapter of the Alpha Delta Phi Fraternity. Survivors with Mr. and Mrs. Scott are two brothers, both on active service. They are Lt. H. J. Scott, 6th Field Ambulance, and Lt.
