Question and Answer

with new Hockey Canada Skills Academy operator, Gene Doray from A.L. Fortune Secondary School

Where did you first hear about the Hockey Canada Skills Academy program?

While I am the principal of A.L. Fortune, I am also a hockey dad, with three young boys playing minor hockey. As a result, I find myself in rinks throughout our province, and I discovered advertisements for Hockey Canada Skills Academies. I was also aware that another school within our district had made a proposal to host an HCSA to our trustees on two previous occasions, only to be turned down, so I spent quite a bit of time researching the different programs in B.C. high schools to figure out what was working, and then embarked upon our own proposal.

What motivated you to actually apply to get a license?

Last year we canvassed our students to find out where their interests were, and one of the overwhelming interests was ice hockey. We ran a skills camp last year and it was a terrific success, and it provoked us to want to expand upon that offering and establish a licensed HCSA that would provide a full semester worth of instruction.

Did you see any change in your school after implementing this program?

As our school has shrunk in size we have not been able to offer all of the teams that we once did, so the HCSA provided us with a program that was able to re-establish a sense of pride in our school.

I think our kids have greatly benefitted from the program and their feedback suggests that one of the biggest improvements they made was actually to their sense of self-confidence. That in itself is a huge accomplishment.

What was your biggest challenge in setting up your academy?

We had to create an “un-academy” for our trustees. Our presentation to the trustees was intended to challenge their thinking about what an “academy” connotes. Visions of elitist groups, easy graduation credits and a capitalist approach to an educational program had to be swayed. My vice-principal and

I showed up to the meeting with our “Rented Mules” men’s league jerseys on and showed them that our goal for our students was one of health, improved morale, passion-based learning and equality.

We set aside money to help support students that couldn’t afford it, we took donations of equipment for students that didn’t have any, and we created the most cost-effective program in the province. The board was unanimous in its support!

How did you overcome it?

See above. We also... partnered with the city of Enderby to get some fantastic prices on ice time.

What do you think is the best thing about this program?

Watching students develop their skills and confidence, seeing our students feel pride in their school, and having a head instructor/teacher who finally has the opportunity to teach his passion.

Would you recommend another school to apply for a Hockey Canada Skills Academy? Why?

I am a huge fan of the HCSA program, as it enables kids to develop their individual skills and supports minor hockey. I like that our off-ice program focused on leadership skills and healthy living. We wanted to balance the “me” focus of being an athlete to a “community” focus so that kids understand the importance of giving back.
